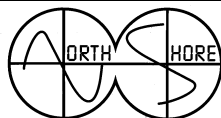

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## 2007 Scugog Circle Century Tour

Members of the NSARC, please mark Sunday, August 26 on your calendars. "What, August 26, 2007, this is only April," you say. Yes, but we have only 3 meetings until your assistance is needed to assist the Oshawa Cycling Club with their primary fund raising event.

The Scugog Circle Century Tour is a tour, not a race for participants. The Oshawa Cycling Club have 4 routes – 60 km., 80 km., 100 km. and 160 km. Each route starts and ends at Durham College. Various checkpoints are provided along the route for refreshments and body breaks. For a number of years NSARC has supported this tour by providing communications via the club's 2-meter repeater VE3OSH. Our offer to provide communications allows the tour organizers to concentrate on the operation of the tour. In prior years we have assisted

with the dispatch of emergency services to help injured riders, monitored riders from checkpoint to checkpoint after a severe fall and generally kept the tour organizers informed of how the event was progressing.

Our Net Control is on the air from about 6:30 a.m. (first riders leave at 7:00 a.m.) until the sweep car arrives at the last checkpoint, which is usually 4:30 p.m. Times for checkpoints to be on the air varies.

We need your communication skills. At least 15 checkpoints need to be manned. A 2-meter HT is all the equipment you need.

All volunteers are provided with:

- A T-shirt
- Box lunch, and
- Barbeque hamburger and soft drinks back at Durham College
