Oshawa repeater, VE3OSH is changing its input (your transmit) frequency from 146.40 to 146.52 by April 1 to conform to the standard input-output separation of 600 kHz. This has been in the wind for more than a year but recently our input channel was required by another group and we had agreed to relinquish it when requested. The new repeater to be located on Grand Island in the Buffalo area is going to be a 'closed' repeater so the rocks you have may not be much use to you but that input.

Orystals are already being ordered via VE3ATI locally and VE3EZM in Toronto who is placing the order. The quoted price is \$4.12 each and if your order is not already in, contact one of the above right away with the details and money. The cut-off date is Feb. 15th at Toronto. The change has been well publicized on the 2m FM nets.
